What does the Bible say about Spring? This season is a time of warming weather and nature coming back to life. As flowers bloom and animals are born, we are reminded of the innocence and beauty that exists in this world and that there is new life all around us. As Christians, we are given new life and new mercies every morning. Spring provides a wonderful reminder to us that we should be living a full life and leaving the old dead parts of life behind. Can we be positive during these challenging times?

This question often troubles Christians, especially when they are struggling with their own challenges and see so much ugliness around the world. Recently I have been 'grounded' at home prior to a visit to hospital and the subsequent recuperation, I haven't found it easy, even my beloved reading has been a struggle! I feel like I have been on a roller coaster of emotions, from being quite depressed about what we see happening in the world and our own country and then being so grateful personally for all the blessings we have. I have had occasions when I've been prompted to reflect upon how I look at things and what I concentrate on each day. So, I felt I should share some of these thoughts with you.

Firstly, I don't know how many of you watch the Channel 4 programme called 'Love it or list it'? It is where Kirsty Allsop and Phil Spencer help couples decide whether they are going to sell their home and move to a larger or more suitable property, or alternatively do some major alterations to meet their current needs in their existing home.

As I recently watched an episode where a beautiful 'kitchen diner' extension had been constructed, I saw in front of me a beautifully painted quote on one of the walls. It was "In everything give thanks" — I initially thought it was somewhat an unusual quote to be on a kitchen wall, but quickly realised how appropriate it really was. It comes from Paul's comment at the end of his first letter to his friends in Thessalonica. (1 Thess 5.18). Even when we do feel surrounded by challenges, some of which seem insurmountable, we must acknowledge that we really do live a privileged life in an area of the world with so many resources to help us, as opposed to so many folk who struggle for the very basics of life. I thought this when I observed some of the amazing resources being used in the Royal Derby recently, where those exceptionally dedicated medics helped so many with their health struggles.

On another occasion I was reading one of Paul's letters, my favourite, the one to his Philippian friends, where he said: "And now, dear brothers and sisters, one final thing. Fix your thoughts on what is true, and honourable, and right, and pure, and lovely, and admirable. Think about things that are excellent and worthy of praise." (Phil 4:8.)

Oh boy! That's so difficult isn't it when we are surrounded by so much negativity, inequality, racism and evil? It seems wherever we look, be it Ukraine, Gaza, Haiti, or our own country we see so much ugliness. But then, without 'burying our heads in the sand' to the reality which exists, Paul is encouraging us to lift our eyes up, and refocus on the positive, true, pure, lovely and admirable things we can see and appreciate. Some may say, "there isn't much evidence of that around me", well, I have been bowled over by so much kindness I've observed recently, simple acts of love and consideration shown to me and others in recent days, which has made my heart glad.

It's true that what we concentrate on has such an influence on our attitudes and outlook. Those who look for good are motivated to get involved with good things and those who concentrate on what's wrong and evil can soon become overwhelmed by negativity.

Paul encourages us to reflect that what we think about really makes a difference. I felt I could really relate to a simple analogy someone shared with me recently, it was a picture of a pathway through the woods; the more we walk along it the clearer and wider it appears, and it becomes easier to walk along. But if we stop using the path it would become overgrown with weeds and brambles and be more difficult to access.

That's what happens with our thought patterns. It appears to me that we have a deliberate choice! The more we think about something repeatedly the more it influences our thought processes. Toxic negative and critical thoughts can so easily overpower our thinking and make that particular 'pathway' wider and more natural. But actively looking for the positive examples and the good things around us makes that alternative pattern of thinking more natural, leaving the negative one to become overgrown and more difficult to find.

With the Holy Spirit's help, replacing negative thoughts with positive ones will gradually mean we'll find ourselves walking a path that is transforming and renewing – not only to our minds but also to our lives and our health!

Finally, just before Paul's above exhortation he says "Don't fret or worry. Instead of worrying, pray. Let petitions and praises shape your worries into prayers, letting God know your concerns". Phil 4. 6. (The Message)

These thoughts have certainly made me think and challenged me as to what I read, what I watch and how I allow my thoughts to wander or concentrate on, bringing all my concerns before the Lord. I hope it's prompted you to examine how you allow your thoughts to focus too!

The Sense of Geese

When you see geese on their annual migrations flying in a "V" formation, you might consider what science has discovered as to why they fly that way. As each bird flaps its wings, it creates an uplift for the bird



immediately following. By flying in a "V" formation,

the whole flock adds at least 71 percent greater flying range than if each bird flew on its own.

People who share a common direction and sense of community can get where they are going more quickly and easily, because they are travelling on the thrust of one another.

When a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of trying to go it alone and quickly gets back into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird in front.

If we have the sense of a goose, we will stay in formation with those people who are heading the same way we are.

When the head goose gets tired, it rotates back in the wing and another goose flies point.

It is sensible to take turns doing demanding jobs, whether with people or with geese flying south.

Geese honk from behind to encourage those up front to keep up their speed. What message do we give when we honk from behind?

Finally - and this is important - when a goose gets sick or injured and falls out of the formation, two other geese fall out with that goose and follow it down to lend help and protection. They stay with the fallen goose until it is able to fly or until it dies; and only then do they launch out on their own or with another formation to catch up with their own group.

If we have the sense of a goose, we will stand by each other like that.




What will we do in heaven?

Lemon Custard Swiss Roll

30m prep

15m cook

8 servings



Ingredients:

- 35g (1/4 cup) custard powder
- 375ml (1 1/2 cups) milk
- 100g (1/2 cup) caster sugar, plus
 55g (1/4 cup) extra
- 3 eggs
- 75g (1/2 cup) self-raising flour
- 75g (1/4 cup) bought lemon curd

Step 1: Place the custard powder in a saucepan. Add 2 tbsp of the milk. Stir until smooth. Add 2 tbs of the extra sugar, then the remaining milk. Place over medium-low heat. Cook, stirring, for 4 minutes or until mixture comes to a simmer. Cook, stirring, for a further 2 minutes or until thickened slightly. Transfer to a heatproof bowl. Set aside for 5 minutes, stirring occasionally, until cooled slightly. Cover the surface with plastic wrap and place in the fridge for 2 hours or until chilled.

Step 2: Meanwhile, preheat oven to 190C/170C fan. Grease a 24 x 30cm (base size) Swiss roll pan and line with baking paper, allowing the paper to overhang the sides.

Step 3: Use electric beaters to beat the eggs in a large bowl for 2 minutes or until well combined. Gradually add the sugar, beating constantly, for 3 minutes or until pale and creamy. Sift the flour over the mixture and use a spatula to fold together until just combined. Pour into the prepared pan. Gently spread out over the base (try not to push out the air in the mixture). Bake for 10 minutes or until the surface is dry and the cake springs back when lightly touched.

Step 4: Place a clean tea towel on a work surface. Place a sheet of baking paper on top. Sprinkle the remaining extra sugar onto the paper. Turn hot cake onto the prepared paper and remove baking paper on base of cake. Starting from a short end, use tea towel to roll the cake to form a log. Transfer to a wire rack, seam-side down, for 1 hour or until cooled completely.

Step 5: Use a wire whisk to whisk the custard until smooth (it may look a bit lumpy, that is okay). Unroll the cooled cake and spread with lemon curd, leaving a 3cm gap at each short end. Spread the custard over the curd. Carefully roll the cake to enclose the filling.

Step 6: Transfer to a serving platter. Cut into slices to serve.
