Talk by Alun Rowlands 7th April 2024

I love the Gospel reading set for this Sunday, John 20 v 19-end. It contains my favourite Disciple Thomas as he seems very human with his doubts yet great faith. Thomas elicits a most wonderful statement from the risen Jesus - *'Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe.'* Well, I'm one of the many billions of people since then who believe so thank you Thomas for drawing that blessing from my Lord and Saviour.

That's me as an individual, but what does it mean to be a member of a Christian church? It could be that the Acts 4 reading set for this Sunday could be seen to describe a perfect Christian Church. Was it really true that the believers were completely one in heart and mind? Did they really share everything in common ownership and did they sell lands or houses and bring the proceeds to lay at the apostles feet to be distributed to each as had need? As with all Scripture though we need to read around it for a fuller picture. When we do, we discover that in later chapters of Acts, there was disagreement, strife and conflict. Then Paul's letters were arguably confronting issues of disagreement in growing churches. It's unfortunately true that complete unity and harmony in Christian circles are rare and unusual.

So, what are we to make of this Acts reading today? Does it mean you have to sign over the deeds of your properties to the Church? Well, no, but there are key messages in here and it is all underpinned by the timeless Easter message – 'On the third day he rose again from the dead.' Differences of opinion are inevitable among humans but spiritual unity is essential – loyalty, commitment, and love for God and Jesus, the Word. The Christians in the reading felt that they were able to share what they had to eliminate poverty among themselves. They wouldn't let a brother or sister suffer when others had plenty. If we consider all the multitude of church denominations, the schisms and theological hair-splitting we wrestle with, the fact is we currently have something like 2.4 billion Christian believers around 2000 years after the resurrection, and that first cry, 'On the third day he rose again from the dead.' In addition, Acts 4:33 tells us the key to it all. 'With great power the apostles gave their testimony to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus, and great grace was upon them all.'

The resurrection created a community of faith among disparate people who had never before been part of such a community. The core conviction that Jesus lives and that he is the resurrected Lord of Life united them and persists all the way to this present day. Our unity is, and never will be perfect. We have a hard time sharing all things in common. And yet amazingly the Church in all its forms is still here. Let's be clear though, none of this is an excuse for the arguments we too often have in our congregations or for the other signs of disunity that mar the church today. Of course, it would be great if more people came to believe and joined us or another branch of the worshipping Church. And wouldn't it be fantastic if more people considered their giving of time, talents and money to charitable causes, including the Church, to eliminate poverty once and for all. But I repeat it's the Spiritual unity of belief in the inescapable fact that Christ rose from the dead to defeat sin and death once and for all that binds all those who profess faith in God our common Father. So, do we have to combine all our worldly possessions under one roof to be good Christians as the reading may suggest? Well, no, but make no mistake, being generous as a Christian should be a given! I offer three key principles for us to consider:

- 1. Their giving was voluntary.
- 2. It didn't involve all possessions, only what was needed.
- 3. It was not a membership requirement to belong.

The truth was though that because of this generosity and the spiritual unity observed by outsiders, people were attracted to them and came to join them. To this day when God's people testify together in harmony and unity to the miraculous fact about Jesus, that - '*On the third day he rose again from the dead'* - it's wonderful and amazing what can happen in God's world in a most dramatic way.

Alleluia. Christ is risen!
