

From Ben Martin, Diocesan Lay Ministries Officer

Friends, while most of you probably already know who I am through my presence on deanery synod, I am pleased to introduce myself in the context of my new role as Lay Ministries Officer for the Diocese of Derby. I would like to spend a little time telling you a bit about what this means, and what I'm here to do.



As a diocese, we are committed to deepening relationships with God, making new disciples, serving local contexts, and challenging injustice as we seek the Kingdom of God, which is good news for all. These four priorities are fundamental to our life as the church historic, current, and future; and most importantly to the discipleship, vocation, and ministry of both clergy and laity. I am here to champion, encourage, and develop ministries amongst the laity – that's all of us who are not ordained, the majority of the church!

I wonder what you think of when you hear the phrase 'lay ministry'? In my nearly 14 years in the diocese, I have come across a huge number of variations, and I'm sure you have too. All of us who are baptised are called to follow Jesus, and that means being confident disciples with a sense of vocation which leads to mission, ministry, and evangelism. That is going to look different for each of us wherever we find ourselves. I am keen to bring energy and imagination into shaping the future of all lay ministries within the diocese. This includes theologically trained lay ministers who hold a license from the bishop as they lead publicly as well as other lay ministries as they are expressed locally from pastoral care teams to chaplaincy to warm hub teams and beyond!

When we gather to worship, we pray 'your kingdom come, your will be done,' and often talk about what it means to be part of that. We want to see people come to know Jesus, walking alongside them as we discover together what it means to be a

disciple of him. This is something that all of us, through confident faith empowered by the Holy Spirit can do as all are called to be ambassadors for Christ.

Rise Up Campaign - Emily Brailsford

On the Monday 26th of February I spoke at a fringe event at the General Synod all about the RISE UP campaign. Things started off a bit worryingly as my colleague Jeanette and I were told we couldn't take our bags upstairs to our allocated room. We then went up three flights of stairs with laptops in hand only to be told our room was back down on the ground floor! I did get to see the ceiling at the very top of the Assembly Hall but sadly didn't enter the Hall. We had asked those who were planning on attending to let us know beforehand. We were expecting only about 5 or 6 people. We had 25 people attend! Funnily enough, I was



less nervous than when I give a sermon at Evensong. Maybe it's because I knew Bishop Libby was there cheering me on from the sidelines. As part of my talk, I mentioned that the statistics on domestic abuse have not improved at all since 2014. When I said this, there was a definite air of disappointment. You could tell that people were frustrated that nothing had improved. I hope those who attended felt uplifted when they heard what Mothers' Union is doing to combat abuse and support victims. Everyone who attended was really receptive to the RISE UP campaign and very supportive of Mothers Union. We held a short Q&A session after my talk which again was really positive. Bishop Libby helped me to plug Mini MU which we are developing here in Derbyshire!!! All in all, it was a really enjoyable few hours doing something that I love, flying the flag for Mothers' Union. Be Smart and Stay Safe on Your Phone or PC

Doesn't it make your blood boil when you hear of someone being ripped off because they've fallen into a scammer's trap? And did you know that we, as churchgoers, may be especially at risk? Here we set out some simple practical tips which will help protect you and yours.

You get an email (or a text, or a WhatsApp message) from a fellow parishioner and it's a tale of woe. Their phone is broken (or lost, or stolen) so you can't call them, but they urgently need money, and they suggest you buy a gift card and send them the code. But it's a scam: the person you know has had their account hacked and they never sent that message, and if you reply with a gift card code, your friend will never get it; instead, your money will be snatched away by a scammer, probably not even in the UK. Some of us fell victim to exactly this scam last year, and as nice people who would always want to help a fellow church member, we may well be especially vulnerable.

Now the Good News

These scams are easy to avoid if you maintain a healthy suspicion and recognise them for what they are: a con. Sadly, we now have to see any situation in which people ask us for money (even if the person appears to be a member of our own family) as a potential scam.

Often little details give the scammer away. Recently, Kate and I and had a message purporting to be from one of our sons, and, yes, you've guessed it, asking for money. But the language was all wrong: we know that neither of them would speak to us like that or make those errors of spelling and punctuation. If it feels wrong, it probably is.

Recently, I was standing in the queue in the bank, ready to pay in the church collection. I couldn't help hearing the man in front explain to the cashier how 'his bank' had called him, warning him that his money was at risk and pestering him to move it to 'a safe account'. Everyone who, like me, was eavesdropping could see where this was heading. But in the end, we heard that this elderly gentleman did not become yet another scam victim, because, as he explained to the cashier "I suddenly realised that you wouldn't speak to me like that, and that it was all a con".

Get Help

Every high street bank now has free information on avoiding scams. You'll find it on their website, or if you'd prefer, they have leaflets you can pick up when visiting your branch.

Charities and advice bodies can also help. For example, Age UK has details on its website on many scams, including those that come via phone, email, and doorstep callers. Go to https://www.ageuk.org.uk/information-advice/money-legal/scams-fraud to find out more. They also have a helpline (0800 678 1602) and can advise you if you think you've been scammed, or you are otherwise worried about fraud. You can also get help from Citizen's Advice (https://www.citizensadvice.org.uk/) — look in their A-Z under 'scams'.

Another reliable source is the government's own National Cyber Security Centre, go to https://www.ncsc.gov.uk/. Here you'll find information aimed at individuals, but there is also advice for anyone who runs a business, club, or any other kind of organisation.

Action Points

With so much available, it can be hard to keep track, so here are some practical tips:

- · Be sceptical about cold calls: it's very easy to get drawn into giving out personal information that can be used to scam you. Just say "we don't take cold calls, thank you" and put the phone down.
- · Remember: fraudsters will often pretend to be someone you trust (police, bank) and will often try to scare you into immediate action by using words such as 'suspect', 'fraudulent' or 'unauthorised'. They may even tell you they are your bank's fraud team. Don't get taken in.
- · Never give out passwords or access codes for any bank account. Even your own bank won't ask you for them (they'll usually just want selected letters or numbers), nor will the Police ever ask you for this info. So, if someone says they are your bank, or the police, and they ask for your full password or PIN, it's a scam.
- · Sometimes people will try to get you to let them put software on your computer, perhaps to "help you solve a problem". It won't, but it could cause a massive one when they get into your online banking and empty any accounts they can find. Don't let them!
- · When dealing with your bank, always contact them by going to their website direct (not via a link you've been sent) or by calling them on a number you know is safe (such as the contact details given on your bank statement).

- · If you get a message asking for money that says "you can't phone me just now" that's a red flag. Always contact your friend or family member by some other method before parting with any money.
- · Be suspicious of delivery scams, where there's a small charge to deliver something stated to be a prize or a gift, or that you don't remember ordering. When you pay the charge by card, scammers will use the details to extract far more from your account.

Finally, be aware of your own vulnerability, especially if you're worried, you've been ill or you're grieving. A few years ago, son Ollie was seriously ill in St Thomas's London. Kate and I had a hotel room at Waterloo to be near him, although we were rarely there together. One day, I got an email from British Gas, saying our account was in debit and requesting an immediate payment. I hate owing money, so I clicked on the link and went through to a website which looked just like the British Gas one.

Just as I was about to enter all my card details, I remembered that we pay this account by Direct Debit: the details about the money owed were fake, as was the email, and the website I was on. I nearly fell for it, because I felt very low at the time, and I'd let my guard down! Sadly, we need to remember those words from the Bible: "Behold, I send you forth as sheep in the midst of wolves: be ye therefore wise as serpents". Stay safe!

Many churches already have good school connections and relationships through assemblies and out-of-school activities. Working within the curriculum gives an added level of meaningful connection; it enables opportunities for table talk discussions as the children engage with thoughtful crafts and activities; and it facilitates being able to address real life topics such as 'how do we decide right or wrong?' and 'what does religion say when life gets hard?'
