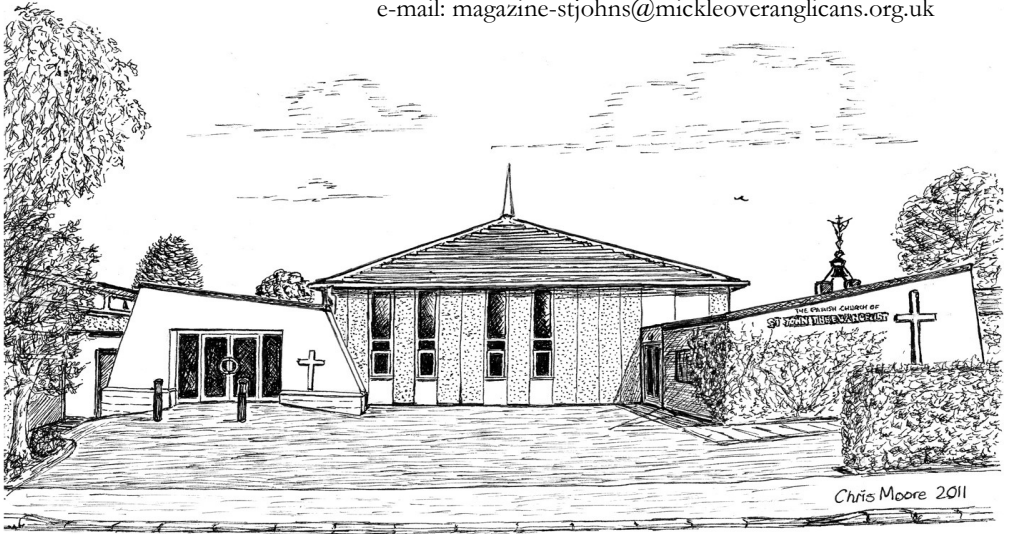

Is it really September?

The answer quite definitely is 'yes' as many of us have been taking advantage of cheaper prices and fewer crowds to go on holiday (that will include Helen and me as we take our summer break at the end of September and the first week of October).

Looking back, it has been a busy summer. Internationally there have been the Olympics and the Paralympics. The weather has been mixed but as I write this we are basking in a forecast week of sunshine – maybe not quite an 'Indian summer' but pretty good nevertheless.

In our gardens, tidying up is taking place. Pruning back shrubs and hedges and dead-heading dahlias or cosmos, so that we might get a few more weeks of colour, before they all come out to be replaced by pansies! Of course the most obvious thing is that the evenings are drawing in, and switching on the central heating is occasionally needed.

But behind the leaves falling, the buds for next year's leaves are growing, and the below the bare earth next spring's bulbs are already coming to life. It always amazes me how early they begin to show again. But this is also a sign to us of God's good grace towards his planet. The seasons remind us that despite our worst endeavours, nature will respond to the shortening of the days, the cooler weather and the inevitable rainfall.

You may not have noticed in the news reports, but the climate is definitely changing. The Sahara has received the biggest dump of rain in living memory, flooding towns and settlements where people live in mud huts, which of course collapse under the pressure of the rain. The floods in Central Europe could so easily have been over us. And that is why we need to continue to make costly changes in our life styles. The days will lengthen again, seeds will sprout and spring up bringing their harvest next year.

And what of the church's year? Harvest will soon be upon us – 29th Sept @ All Saints, 13th October @ St Andrews, and 20th October @ St Johns. Harvest reminds us to be thankful that despite our challenges we continue to enjoy food to eat and water to drink.

I was very struck by the most recent set of statistics regarding poverty in Derby. Over 20,000 adults and over 13,000 children had to be regularly helped by food banks across the City in these last 12 months. That is about 14% of the population of the city of Derby. The total cost is over £500k. Local charities are facing the winter very low on food and provisions and indeed on financial reserves. So, let us all be as generous as we can, and not only now, but also in the colder months too.

There is a food pantry based in the old school rooms on the Parade here in Mickleover. Any excess food is taken to other food banks across the city. Do let friends and neighbours know, and encourage them to donate.

It is also the time of year when we look at all our churches charitable giving. St John's and All Saints have long had a policy of tithing from our income. The PCCs are considering which charities we should support. If you have suggestions or would like to join a small group that reviews the list of charities, please let the Treasurers or any of the clergy know.

That is followed by Remembrance (10th November) – did you know that Mickleover is the only parade that happens in Derby other than the one in the centre of town? That has come about because of the fund raising that has taken place to pay for the event management company that will keep us all safe on the march. Each year between £1500 and £2000 is needed to be raised. That includes paying for insurance against accidents etc. This year's theme is 'D-Day 80 years on.'

A choir from the local primary schools will be taking part, and there will hopefully be slightly less stress this year as the turret clock at All Saints has been automated during the summer and strikes bang on the hour (A huge thank you to all those volunteers over the years who have gone up the ladders twice a week to wind the clock up – you can take a well earned retirement!)

And then the run into Christmas. Our Mickleover's Christmas Fete is on Sunday 24th November, starting with Churches Together Christmas Carols at 4pm at All Saints, supported by Newmount Brass Band.

As a clergy team we are looking at how we can have a more reflective afternoon advent service during December at St John's, before we get

into the usual round of carol services across all three churches – more details to follow.

Please be praying for the Readers and Clergy and for everyone who volunteers week by week in support roles. It is very easy to get discouraged amidst the busyness. I always give thanks to God when the rotas are completed for the following month but it is always a huge juggling act accommodating everyone's availabilities.

Finally, we worship and serve a loving Lord who continues to watch over all of us and encourages us to look to him for guidance. These are his Churches, not ours. He has led us all in the past, and he will lead us all in the future. Our job is to listen and to obey, and at the same time be kind to one another as we serve Him.

May all the glory go to God. Amen!

What frightens us?

...by his death he might... free those who all their lives were held in slavery by their fear of death. Hebrews 2:14-15

I wonder what frightens you? Personally, I'm claustrophobic, so I don't like elevators, hate crowds and do my best to avoid any room without windows. Some people I know have no problem with those situations but go into panic if they see a mouse or a spider. One friend of mine can't stand heights and won't even go up a steep staircase for fear of falling. The point is, we all have things of which we're fearful – some common, some unusual – but the fear that's most common around the world is the fear of death.

Fear is a harsh taskmaster. It's always bossing us around, trying to control what we do. But it doesn't have to be that way. With God on our side, we have the resources to tell fear that it's not our boss anymore and we don't have to submit to it. This is especially true when it comes to fear of death. Because of Jesus' death and resurrection, the power of the devil, who holds the power of death, has been broken. Our bodies will pass away, but our spirits, that part of us which is created in the image of God, will never die. And because of Jesus, we have nothing to fear on the day of judgement, 'because fear has to do with punishment' (1 John 4:18) – but Jesus took our punishment on himself, so we can be confident in his love.

Note from the Editor: The third in the series of reminiscences about some of the “St John’s Characters” by Colin and Ann Haxell.

BETTY SMITH AND EILEEN YORK

Betty and Eileen were friends and colleagues who worked in the Maternity Unit at the hospital. Eileen was something important ‘Front Of House’, and was awarded an MBE for her work. Betty came to visit me after our David was born and the other patients were impressed that I knew Sister Smith!

Betty lived opposite the church in a bungalow with a large garage. It was frequently used by the church to store all kinds of things, especially when we had big occasions to cater for or lots of bric-a-brac. For a number of years Betty and Eileen and Lorna Wilshire had a weekly stall on Allenton Market and the proceeds came to St John’s. They also used to purchase all Santa’s gifts (often on their summer holidays) for the Advent Fair Santa.

When they retired Eileen came to live in Mickleover. She was running a Lunch Club at St Augustine’s where she worshipped and for a number of years Betty went to help her. On one occasion there was an ecumenical event held at Our Lady Of Lourdes, and Eileen was efficiently producing plates of sandwiches for everyone.

In 2001 there was a Parish pilgrimage to Iona. Betty and Eileen arrived with matching luggage, a medium sized case and a smaller one on one set of wheels. The smaller one was for their overnight stop. Very well organised, as ever. Betty told me afterwards that she had been a bit worried about bringing Eileen, but she joined in and really enjoyed it. That was a very special parish event.

Betty was a good person to go to when our son had appendicitis, and again when our baby grandson was critically ill.

There is no doubt that Eileen missed Betty terribly when Betty died. They used to have coffee in Betty’s house each week after church with their friend ‘Big Betty’. Notwithstanding Eileen soldiered on into her 90’s. She used to make lovely sponge cakes, sometimes in the middle of the night when she couldn’t sleep. She had an apple tree in her garden and also made apple pies for church events. She once said to me, “It’s no good being miserable, people don’t want to be around you if you are”. Good advice!. Two lovely ladies.

Lord, you are our Anchor in times of change

I have in recent months felt unsettled by the changes in the church structure, but there is such a lot of love within the church. Just a thought.....

Why do gardeners welcome butterflies but wage war on caterpillars?

Thoughts on *Where are we going?*

We are two people in different circumstances coming from different Church of England parishes who have joined St John's during the last few years. We haven't experienced all that longstanding members have worked to achieve over past years, but we have heard a lot that convinces us that there has been a truly Christian community here and that there is a desire and determination that it should continue. As we have become increasingly involved in St John's and taken on responsibilities we would like to share our experience and thoughts on the important points that Paul has made in his September magazine article.

Karen - *Covid drew me into the community of Mickleover Anglicans. The church I was attending did not offer online services, and watching the pre-recorded services on the BBC left me feeling more isolated than ever. Looking for a more interactive online offering, I came upon Mickleover Anglicans Zoom services. It must have been early April 2020 when I first joined, and in that first breakout room I was in a group with Petronella Warman whom I have known for over 35 years, what a coincidence, or 'Godincidence'. The experience changed my place of worship and the course of my retirement and have not looked back. I have never felt so welcomed or loved by a church, my husband even commented on how much more positive I seemed.*

To begin with I had no idea of who was part of St John's and who was All Saints, or of what a 'normal service' at either church looked like. I sensed a church community joining with worship in the best way possible, sharing life changing pandemic problems while continuing to worship God and be moved by the Spirit.

Gradually I became involved in helping with Rest Stop café, reading in church, joining one of the Setting God's People Free groups, not because I felt pressurised, but because I wanted to be a part of church life. More recently I have started JACK, a

group for children at one service a month, and some of us on the PCC are looking at other opportunities to improve our welcome, particularly to reach young adults and families.

There is a special atmosphere in our church building, the tangible presence of the Holy Spirit. This nudged me to revisit my calling to become a Lay Reader. Despite my being relatively new to the congregation, Peter encouraged me. The support of the entire ministry team and that of the church community has brought me to the point of being close to the end of my training.

I am aware that our services and other activities have changed since the pandemic. However, on Sunday mornings, and other occasions, there remains an atmosphere of joy, support, welcome and love. Those who have been there for decades and those of us new to the parish meet, welcome others and share a mission to reach out to the wider community.

Richard - *Melanie and I joined St John's in 2018 on moving from Repton, from a very different community, a congregation very conscious of its large nationally important historic building and its tradition of over 1300 years of Christian worship. We were attracted to St John's by the warm welcome, variety of worship and teaching from the ministry team, the invitation to join a house group, and opportunity to join in social events.*

Covid brought challenges and opportunities. We emerged from lockdown with a different pattern of worship that continues to evolve, and new ventures started, notably Rest Stop Café.

I was grateful not to be immediately pestered to take on duties and it was gradually through conversations with clergy and others that I got involved with organising events, joining the café team, and being elected to the PCC. It was a challenge in 2021 to be asked to consider election as churchwarden. After thought and prayer I decided that while I was relatively fit and active I should take my turn in a leadership position. I am immensely grateful for the support and encouragement that I had in that role.

It will be apparent that we have both been inspired by the truly Christian atmosphere at St John's and that this leads us to believe that, despite challenges, there is a great future. Together we should patiently seek the guidance of the Spirit and keep engaged in prayer, study of scripture, worship, and listening to teaching.

1. "Tea and a cup of love" . A line from a song about a soup kitchen. Is this what we are trying to achieve at Rest Stop cafe?
2. Don't confuse holiness and snobbery. An example is when it's considered ok to have ballet in a cathedral but a disco is unacceptable.
3. Sometimes in life you have to widen your stance because you know there's a wave coming. I like this analogy in relation to grief, widening your stance when you are preparing for a birthday, anniversary, Christmas, Mother's Day.
4. The church of park run. Park run is a timed 5k run that happens every Saturday morning in over 2000 locations in 20 countries. Is your church like park run?

At park run everyone is welcome. It doesn't matter if you are new to running or have been a runner for many years. At park run you will be welcomed, encouraged and supported. It doesn't matter if you have all the gear, or if you turn up in wellies and a tutu.

You can turn up at any park run and receive a warm welcome. Whether you go every week or only occasionally. The slowest runner/walker will be encouraged and cheered, accompanied by the tail walker or allowed to wander along alone, depending on what they prefer.

Does your church welcome everyone, whether they are experienced, knowledgeable and equipped or are only tentatively beginning their journey?

Snippets from the September PCC meeting

Proposals to proceed with the combined benefice magazine from February 2025 were agreed. This will be produced in electronic and paper versions. Content will include news and information from All Saints', St Andrew's as well as full coverage of St John's activities.

Charitable giving donations for 2024 were agreed, continuing to commit 10% of our gross income to support good causes. Home giving mainly goes to those in need locally through the Padley Centre, Derby Food for Thought, and the Derby Refugee Advice Centre. Overseas giving includes our ongoing commitment to Friends of Kenya's Children along with Wateraid and Shelterbox.

There was wide ranging discussion on the important issues raised by Paul Gribbin's article in Contact for September. Points covered included: continuing to make it known that the ministry team and wardens are always open to being approached about concerns or queries; communication with the wider congregation is vital as much good work is done but not known about; we need always to respect each other's views and be kind; concerns about the future are common to almost all parishes and we need to take time to pray and seek guidance of the Spirit when working out where we are going.

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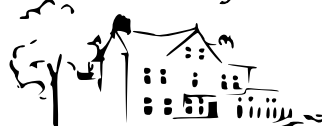
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
