## Talk based on Readings: Job 42 1 to 6, 10 to end, Mark 10:46 to end

We have come to the end of our walk with Job. The way it is written sounds in some ways like a 'happy ever after' Hollywood ending. Job has passed all the testing and God rewards him because he has retained his innocence.

I want to focus on the first 6 verses here, before we look at the Gospel reading.

After God's speeches to Job, out of the storm – Job realizes finally that there is no comparison between him, a human being and the Almighty God. Verse 3 – 'I have uttered what I did not understand, things too wonderful for me, which I did not know....'

The issue here in making his strong complaints against God, Job has moved dangerously close to pride, i.e. being certain that he is able to judge God or know better than God. And so, in making his confession, Job is confirming that humility is essential for a living relationship with God.

The thing he wanted most of all (Chapter 19: 25 to 27), which was to hear and see God, had come to pass. Just as with Moses approaching God on Mount Sinai, God had had to veil himself in the storm so that Job would not be consumed by God's holiness, but Job hearing God speaking so clearly is akin to seeing. 'Now my eye sees you..... I repent in dust and ashes.' No more questions.

And so we turn to our Gospel reading. How do these stories relate? No doubt Bartimaeus's parents will have been told that their son's blindness from birth was a judgment from God, in much the same way Job's friends had challenged Job 'to confess the sins' that had led to his trials?

Bartimaeus didn't have a theological issue to work out however, all he wanted was healing from the Lord. And his declaration: "Jesus, son of David, have mercy on me" was absolutely spot on, for it recognized Jesus as King (by the reference to David), and his own personal need for mercy.

I can't claim to understand what that must have meant for him to have lived with blindness from birth, but my own experience three years ago of being sat down by the Optician and being told in all seriousness that unless I presented myself to hospital immediately and was operated on ASAP, I would go blind in my right eye was a salutary reminder to me of the precious gift of sight. I do own up to the profound sense of shock that I felt. And the experience after the operation of relying on Helen and Gareth for help for the most basic elements of life was an important experience of vulnerability.

Quite how Bartimaeus gets to hear that Jesus is in the crowds (going up to the Festival), we aren't told but maybe some kind person tells him. Jesus' reputation has clearly gone before him. So he cries out.

The crowds told him to be quiet. After all, this will upset the authorities, he could have been arrested for linking the name of Jesus to the title 'Son of David'. Bartimaeus despite

his blindness saw what others didn't, he calls Jesus Messiah.... but however much they try to keep him quiet, he shouts out all the louder..... 'Son of David have mercy on me!'

You can imagine the tut-tutting in the crowds... who does he think he is? but Jesus stops and said 'Call him'. At this point the crowds change and instead encourage him to go. 'Cheer-up! On your feet! He's calling you!'

It seems that no-one offered to help him to get to his feet, but instead he jumped up, threw his cloak aside and came to Jesus. I'm sure his sense of direction from his hearing must have been far more acute than it would be for any one of us. He hot foots it to Jesus. Jesus looks at him and asks him with compassion.

51 "What do you want me to do for you?"

The blind man said, "Rabbi, I want to see."

52 "Go," said Jesus, "your faith has healed you." Immediately he received his sight and followed Jesus along the road.

It would have been so easy for Jesus to walk on by because he had to get to Jerusalem but he didn't. He had compassion. Jesus had told Bartimaeus to 'Go' but instead he follows. And in Luke's gospel, we are told that : '(Bartimaeus) praised God. When all the people saw it [the healing], they also praised God.'

What lessons can we learn from this encounter?

[1] "The value of persistent prayer is not that He will hear us, but that we will finally hear Him." (William McGill)

When Jesus speaks, he asks Bartimaeus a simple question. Jesus may know all the secret longings of our hearts but he still wants us to voice our requests. Why? Because speech implies that he and we are in a relationship. Sometimes Helen will say to me 'I can't read your mind'. We need to speak.

[2] Secondly, if we are tempted to think that we are not good enough to draw near, Jesus said (in John 6: 37):

All that the Father gives me will come to me, and whoever comes to me I will never drive away.

May we as Christians never stop anyone, especially those from the outside from meeting Jesus. On the contrary may we welcome and encourage those who come among us to place their trust in Jesus the Messiah. Amen.
