Talk based on Mark 12 v 28-34

'A relationship with God is not about how we believe, it's about how we love and listen.' Rabbi Lizzi Heydemann.

I came across this as I was researching the Shema. The ancient prayer recited by Jews twice a day, taken from the scriptures of Deuteronomy. Jesus uses this in his answer to the Scribe's question at the beginning of our gospel reading, 'What commandment is the first of all?'

Jesus replies 'Hear oh Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one; you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength.'

People of the time would have been familiar with this because it comes from the Old Testament scriptures, God gives the commandments to Moses in Exodus, and then, when quoted in Deuteronomy there is the inclusion of 'Hear oh Isreal.'

Jesus answer to the Scribe, subtly changes the original commandment to include; 'with all your mind.' This is significant because it brings an intellectual reference into how to love.

Let's start by considering love, what do we understand by loving God and loving others? Deuteronomy ch 6 v 5, commands us to; 'love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul and all your might,' a straightforward instruction. As Christians we understand the concept of loving God, with all our being. The addition of; 'with all your mind,' adds a new dimension, something more cerebral. If we use our minds does that give us more control over loving, can we make an active choice to love people? This may not be very helpful in terms of romantic love, usually, we cannot decide to fall in love or out of love with someone, but it seems to me to make the instruction to love your neighbour a bit easier to comprehend. In the 21st century, Jesus' instruction can aid us to fulfil his additional commandment of, 'You shall love your neighbour as yourself.'

In His answer, Jesus wanted the Scribe to understand the importance of Love. I think we can identify with the Scribe even though we are separated by more than 2000 years, because, as we usually find with the scriptures, they are relevant and speak to us today. We need to understand that love should be at the centre of our relationship with God and our relationships with all other people. Jesus uses the Shema to emphasise the one true God and that we should respond to Him by loving with our entire being. We can demonstrate this through the action of loving our neighbour as ourselves. This does not mean we all love ourselves in some vain and conceited way, rather that we should demonstrate our love of God through our love and respect for

all people. We may not understand or agree with others, but we can still choose to love them if we set our minds to it.

Think of the story of the Good Samaritan which shows us, it is not just our fellow Christians we should love and respect, it is everyone, regardless of their age, gender, race, religion, or anything else making them different from us. In today's context we are being asked to love the addicts, the refugees, the asylum seekers, those who struggle with their gender, the list goes on. Often, we do not understand some of these lifestyles and situations, and we can really struggle to love. Even more challenging, how do we love those initiating and enabling conflicts around the world, well I hold my hand up to finding that extremely difficult. Jesus is asking us to engage our minds and set them to loving others. That may be by encouraging openness and communication, or it may simply be by listening without judging.

The Scribe's response to Jesus gives us more to consider. He replies to Jesus; 'This is much more important than all burnt offerings and sacrifices.' The message is that the action of love does not centre around ritual and tradition. Things such as ensuring we wear the correct liturgical colour and use the liturgy and worship according to tradition means nothing if it is done without love. Think about a wedding, so often the reception becomes the main focus of the event rather than the ceremony, and trivial things seem to be so important. Only last week I was reminded of this by an episode of Peppa Pig watched with my grandson. The adult animals were saying the dress and cake and rings were very important. I am not sure how this was interpreted in the mind of an almost 3 year old, but hopefully the 'granny influence', ensured he at least heard about the importance of commitment before God to share your lives together.

Jesus recognised the Scribe's understanding. Do we understand as he did? Are we living our lives centred around love for God, worked out through love for our neighbour? Do not panic, we are not perfect and at times we may fail to live out these commandments. What I believe is that God wants us to try, and to keep this passage at the forefront of our minds to help us.

When I began to work on this sermon, Tina Turner's song, 'What's love got to do with it?' Was going round and round in my head until it spun into this message for me to leave with you; 'Love has everything to do with the Christian Faith; and the Christian Faith has everything to do with love.'
