Talk for the notices: 1 Corinthians15 1 to 11, Luke 5 1 to 11

Christian humility which we saw in our late Queen, comes from her deep rooted faith in Jesus Christ (no doubt the Queen's great sense of humour which allowed her not to take herself too seriously helped). And so it is interesting that both of our readings today also record the importance of humility.

The only eye-witness account we have of Paul records that he was bald, but that he had a twinkle in his eyes. "A man of small stature, with a bald head and crooked legs, in a good state of body, with eyebrows meeting and nose somewhat hooked." In other words he wasn't a Hollywood star look alike.

He didn't consider himself a 'super-apostle' but as one 'untimely born'. It was the Lord's direct intervention on the Damascus Road that stopped Saul in his tracks as he was on his way to arrest followers of 'the Way'. Saul who became Paul, was absolutely committed to God's call on his life. But he had to change his thinking completely. Not just to recognise that Jesus was the Messiah for the Jewish people but also (and for this he was regularly beaten), for the Gentiles too. And he writes: 'But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace towards me has not been in vain'. I want to come back to that phrase a little later, but what of our Gospel reading?

Here the awesome majesty of Jesus Christ is revealed. Not in a blinding light on the road, but in the enormous catch of fish that the disciples catch, after they have fished all night and caught nothing, Jesus (not known for his fishing prowess) has told them to do what they would never do ordinarily and tells them to put their nets down for a catch in the day time.

On seeing the catch, Peter's immediate reaction is to say – 'Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man'. Peter was echoing the prophet Isaiah when he was called and given a vision of heaven when Isaiah declared 'I am a man of unclean lips, and my eyes have seen the Almighty'. The Angel in Isaiah's vision flew to the altar and brought back a live coal which he then touched Isaiah's lips declaring him to be clean. Sometimes we need to confess our sins, but we do so remembering the promises of Scripture that as we do, God is faithful and just to forgive us our sins because we rely on the shed blood of Jesus on the cross.

In Peter's case notice how Jesus responds. Not with 'you're right Peter' 'You are completely useless, you are a sinful man and so you can never be a part of my plan'. No. Jesus responds by saying what he says each and every time to those he calls. 'Do not be afraid'...... and then he gave Peter a commission in terms he could understand. From now on, Jesus says to Peter, 'you will be catching people.' Does Peter get it right all the time from then on? No. Indeed, Peter denied knowing Jesus three times at the

point at which Jesus was put on trial. But praise God after the resurrection, Jesus reinstated Peter and it all happens at breakfast on the beach on the shores of Lake Galilee. Peter and his friends had gone fishing over night. In the morning, when they were coming back to shore, they see a shadowy figure on the shoreline.

Jesus then calls out 'Friends, haven't you caught anything? Their dejected response 'no' leads to him telling them to put their nets down on the other side of the boat and again so many fish are caught that it became clear to Peter that it was the resurrected Lord speaking. Peter dresses, jumps into the water and goes to shore and then Jesus tenderly invites Peter to affirm that he loves him, three times to mirror Peter's three-fold denial of Jesus earlier.

These appearances, or 'Theophanies' demanded a response. And whether it was Isaiah, Peter or Paul, each responded to God's call in humility recognising that God is indeed Almighty and having said yes to Jesus, their lives were never to be the same again. Jesus called each of them to a particular task, but not to be done in their own strength, but instead, in humility, completely reliant on God's grace.

Paul said, 'by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace towards me has not been in vain'.

What a wonderful way of putting it.

We must never think that our past has to completely shape our future, God is the God who transforms us and helps us. His spirit re-shapes us and gives us the strength, yes, the humility to walk hand in hand with him.

As Louise Minnie Haskins put it in her poem 'The gate of the year' in 1908.....

'I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year,

"Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown."

And he replied,

"Go into the darkness and put your hand into the hand of God.

That shall be to you better than light and safer than a known way."
