

CLERGY ARTICLE

As I write this, the sun is shining, the temperatures are rising and from now until September 21st, daylight will be longer than night-time! Nature is definitely waking up. Spring is a time for tilling, sowing and planting.

Yesterday on a visit to Radbourne, I had the delight of seeing a Comma Butterfly. I have had reports of the yellow Brimstone butterflies on the wing too on Mickleover Meadows. Both are so welcome to see alongside birds nesting (as I write this, I can see a pair of Nuthatches cleaning out their nest hole in a lime tree in All Saints Graveyard).

Easter this year comes almost as late as it can be on 20th April. The feast moves on our calendar as it relates to the phases of the moon. Indeed, because the gospels record the historic events of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter as coinciding with the Jewish Passover, the early church modelled the time of Easter to be around the annual celebration of Passover. Like other Jewish holy days, Passover is scheduled on a lunar calendar, not a solar one. As a result, Easter is the first Sunday after the paschal full moon.

Christmas on the other hand bears no relationship with the Jewish calendar but instead falls after the shortest day of the year when pre-Christian pagan faiths held their mid-winter festivals. These festivals were to do with praying for the return of the sun and fertility.

Turning back to Easter, the gospel writer for this lectionary year is Luke. Although Luke was not an apostle (or a disciple) while Jesus was on earth, it is clear that he was a very early follower following the resurrection as he accompanied Paul on his missionary journeys. He opens his gospel with these words: 'Many have undertaken to draw up an account of the things that have been fulfilled among us, just as they were handed down to us by those who from the first were eye-witnesses and servants of the word. With this in mind, since I myself have carefully investigated everything from the beginning, I too decided to write an orderly account for you, most excellent Theophilus*, so that you may know the certainty of the things you have been taught.' (* literally God lover)

Luke wasn't a Hebrew, he was Greek. And maybe because of this, he wrote with a particular slant towards stories of Jesus' encounters with outsiders, those who were poor. He particularly wrote about Jesus' meetings with women. He writes with compassion. He writes also to an audience who had little or no previous knowledge of the history of God's dealings with the Israelites over the millennia.

We now live in a society where our young people especially have very little or no knowledge of Bible stories. But they do have a strong interest in spirituality. Sales of Bibles are soaring among teenagers. It is clear that God's Holy Spirit is on the move again in our generation. Our focus as God's people must therefore be to pray for families who are facing many challenges and for our schools.

The recent visits by Aidan Watson (Diocesan Strategic Lead Youth Ministry) to All Saints and St John's PCCs challenged us to make praying for children and schools our major priority, whether it is when we are praying in our quiet times on our own, during intercessions in our Sunday services and on other days in the week. As we focus our thoughts, our longings and our desires for young people and turn them into prayer, God will answer our prayers and will lead us in our reaching out.

Although we don't have any church schools in our benefice, we do have good relationships with all the primary schools who value our welcome when they bring children in to look at the building, but also on other occasions when they come to hear the story of Christmas and Easter.

It is our responsibility to hand our faith on, but we are not on our own in this endeavour for we, just like the first disciples after Pentecost, have the Holy Spirit living within us. The Spirit gives us the words to say and helps us to share our testimony of God's faithfulness.

Maybe a good thing to do as I shared a couple of weeks ago is to write down our testimony of God's faithfulness to us in good times and in bad, so that when our children/grandchildren ask us to share it, they will hear first hand what it means to be a follower of Jesus Christ, the word of God. I came to faith aged 18, but I know that the mother of my best friend from school had faithfully, diligently and consistently prayed for me over the previous 6 or so years.

The Resurrection tells us not to give up hope when everything seems black (Easter Sunday followed Good Friday) Today, when everything is being shaken, let us instead focus our love, our prayers and our worship on the one who came to save the world and bring the world back into relationship with God our creator.

The Easter Collect for our prayers:

God of glory, by the raising of your Son, you have broken the chains of death and hell: fill your church with faith and hope; for a new day has dawned and the way to life stands open in our Saviour Jesus Christ. Amen.

TALK BY REVD AIDAN WATSON TO ALL SAINTS' AND ST JOHN'S PCCS



Revd Aidan Watson, Derby Diocese Strategic Lead for Youth Ministry has recently given inspiring talks to both All Saints' and St John's PCCs on how we might develop our work with children and young people. Here is a brief summary of his talk to St John's PCC:

Aidan led us in thinking about the way ahead in terms of children and young people and how we need to make them the "heart of everything that we do." He mentioned the evidence of young people's growing interest in faith and the Church of England's Growing in Faith initiative:

Children and young people should be a consistent focus for prayer, not only in our individual prayer life but always in our corporate worship. Children need to be made welcome and feel involved, and come to feel that church is a kind of home. Bringing children and young people in to church will not be quick and the church in which they are involved will look different.

Thinking about the way ahead and what we need to be doing the following points were made:

- Possibilities for activities during school holidays
- No-one is too old to be involved with children and young people
- Need to pray for access to local junior schools
- Remember to keep the congregation up to date with our thinking and work with children
- This work is God's mission, not ours

As an example of what can be done Aidan showed a short video of an initiative at Dinting Vale where the church is open for children after school on Friday afternoons <u>dintingchurch.org.uk/</u> From small numbers this has grown to 70-90 children coming in for tea and toast. It's organised by a congregation of about 30, mostly over 70.

VEGAN FLAPJACK

the inspiration for this came from visiting a café in South Devon last October overlooking Bigbury Beach!

You will need a 23cm/9in square cake tin and baking parchment to line.

- 1. Set your oven to 160C/325F
- 2. Grease the cake tin then line with the parchment.
- 3. Weigh the following dry ingredients into a mixing bowl (note: you can vary the sorts of nuts and fruit and seed and their amounts depending on what you like) but essentially the overall weight you add nuts/dried fruit/seed is the same as the weight of oats it is definitely a case of try it and see.
 - 350g fine rolled porridge oats
 - 80g plain flour
 - 100g of mixed nuts roughly chopped
 - 200g of mixed dried fruit (I used raisins and cranberries if using larger dried fruit they would need to be chopped up)
 - 50g of mixed seeds (I used an Omega 3 mix)
- 4. Weigh into a pan the following ingredients and gently heat and stir until it is thoroughly melted and mixed together (don't overheat).
 - 200g of Stork (or dairy free butter)
 - 175g of golden syrup
 - 200g of light brown soft sugar

Then bring everything together in the mixing bowl. When thoroughly mixed, tip into the lined baking tray, press down so that it fills up to the corners and edges and then place in the centre of the oven. The cooking time should be between 25 and 35 minutes. When you take it out of the oven, the flapjack will be a little soft. Leave it in the tin to cool on a rack and after about 10 minutes cut into and across the flap jack to make squares or slices so that when it has thoroughly cooled you can then more easily break it apart into pieces and place into a box for storage. Enjoy!

PCC NOTES

Meeting held at: All Saints on 10th March 2025

Full minutes available at the back of Church and on the website

Aidan Watson (Diocesan Strategic Lead for Youth Ministry) had been invited to the meeting. Aidan gave a presentation and video – 'Growing faith in church'. There followed a general discussion and chats regarding praying regularly for children in school and church ('Getting that into our DNA').

Dates for Diocesan training: 19th March and 21st June 2025 – All Welcome.

Finance: Brian Devenport updated the meeting on the year-to-date figures. The 2024 Draft Annual Financial report was agreed.

Other matters discussed by the PCC: moving the oak doors to become external and installing new glass internal doors. Mock-up photographs circulated. Discussion around ideas for the design, wording or symbol(s) on the glass doors. It was agreed that these mock-ups would go to annual meeting, before going for Faculty Approval. Prior to this being done it was agreed that the stone mason did a fabulous job of the replacing the stonework on the porch and that we should if we can, bring him back to replace the pillar stonework on the other side. We will apply for another grant to cover costs. Quinquennial repairs – a quotation of £6,356.86 had been received for the chimney repair on the north side of the church (leading to moisture getting into the church). It was proposed to seek a grant. We would apply for a faculty under List B (repairs) for this work before it is carried out.

New computer for All Saints and IT progress: Clare updated the current position of IT upgrade. File access is no longer limited to location.

Maintenance issues for the Church and Centre: East end wooden floor clean – ongoing; replacement ladder access to Bell Chamber – Dave still looking for a suitable ladder; Church centre inners door locks to be replaced.

Safeguarding matters: The next training session set up for 15th March 2025

Benefice Magazine: Threefold - No negative comments had been received and the editors and Rebekah were thanked and praised.

Electoral Roll complete revision: James B reported up to 75 forms back. He will identify who were not on the old list. The date for closing the Electoral Roll revision is on Sunday 20th April.

HEAR! HEAR!

In myself, I don't feel any older now than I ever have done; but there's no doubt at all that this body that I'm currently inhabiting is, after some seventy-odd years, definitely showing signs of wear and tear!

Ignoring the odd aches, the dodgy knees and the need to remember my inhalers, one thing that has been creeping up on me for a few years now is awareness that my ears are no longer all that they used to be. While they are 'adequate', there's no doubt that those high ('treble') frequencies just aren't there in the way that they once were.

As St John's folk already know, both of our daughters are deaf, so I come from a 'deaf aware' family and we're probably 'ahead of the curve' in losing the social stigma that has in the past been attached to deafness. So – time for me to check out my own hearing-aid options!

Being born in the 1950's, I'm (of course) a strongly committed, 'NHS Person' and a couple of months back I finally obtained my NHS hearing-aids. (There's another story in there about outsourcing of NHS services but let's save that for some future time or a private conversation.) Hearing-aids have come a long way in the past forty years! Even these basic aids 'talk' to each other, synchronising sound-balance and such, and I was delighted to find that they also connect to my phone, allowing me to have phone-conversations completely through my hearing-aids – a very handy feature. (I can also enjoy my music collection in a similar way – possibly much to Sue's relief.)

My brain was a bit shocked when I first started wearing them. After years of 'muddy' hearing it was shouting, "Too much information!" for quite a while – please do be prepared for this if or when you tread this path. But then the sounds of yore started coming back – the clicking of the dog's paws on the pavement, the rustling of a newspaper, the crashing of the pots and pans while washing up, Mr Robin declaring his territorial domain ...

Not that it's affected me directly, but I'm glad that the past stigma of deafness is now fading – and I wonder if the common use of wireless 'earbuds' these days is helping – it's now quite usual for folk to have machines stuck in their ears! (Of course, I'm at an advantage here – my machines do all the things that those earbuds do and more. Lucky me!)

Even with today's technology, it's wrong to expect hearing aids to 'correct' one's hearing in the same way that lenses 'correct' one's vision but, personally, having now sampled the difference that they make, I'm very happy to accept the improvement and live with the limitations.

THE PUZZLE OF BONE CANCER

So, just HOW is money raised from selling your used stamps spent?

Osteosarcoma has long been difficult to fully understand due to the complex genetic changes which drive its development. However, recent analysis of samples from different osteosarcoma patient groups has revealed a crucial piece of the missing puzzle.

A team of researchers, analysed the largest collection of genetic data from osteosarcoma patients to investigate the cancer's underlying causes. This vital data was made available thanks to the 100,000 Genomes Project — allowing the team to look for clues across the entire genetic code. In doing so, the team found a crucial mechanism, called the loss-translocation-amplification chromothripsis, which causes errors and re-arrangements in the genetic code leading to the aggressive development and progression of osteosarcoma.

The team discovered that this mechanism occurred in approximately 50% of high-grade (aggressive) osteosarcoma cases. Alongside shining a light on the complex biology which leads to an aggressive tumour type, this research also identified an indicator or "prognostic biomarker" which may be used to predict a patient's outcome and the likely course their disease will take, with the hope of moving towards a more personalised approach to treatment.

Please keep saving your stamps, and encourage others.

Together we will solve the Puzzle!

The cost of stamps has risen dramatically and I feared that this would affect Christmas Card delivery which is the biggest stamp outlay. So I am delighted that we have managed to raise 2.5kg of Used Stamps which will help us to find a cure for cancer.

EVERYDAY FAITH

In March's issue of 'Threefold', Peter gave a very useful overview of the background to the action planning process we use in the Benefice and then he expanded on the first five items on the current issue of the Plan. I (Paul) am personally very enthusiastic over this process because in using the very name 'Everyday' it reflects that our faith is about every aspect of our lives and not just a "Sunday thing"!

It's also a 'living document', certainly not set in stone, but continually developing as our church and community's needs develop or change. The next five items on our current benefice action plans are listed and expanded as follows:

- **6. Focusing on families we are already in contact with** We have many families visiting our churches for their special 'life events' such as Baptisms, weddings and funerals. Each of these gives us an opportunity to show friendship and support to the folk who attend. We believe we should explore ways we can continue these initial contacts, when it is welcome, encouraging families to understand more of the appropriate relevance of the Christian faith in our current world. JACK (SJ)/Messy Church, 'Who let the Dads out?' and Breakfast Church (AS) certainly provide great opportunities to see what is possible in this area, but we should consider others as well.
- 7. St John's to discuss with congregation the future development of our worship and outreach We have always considered the breadth of churchmanship, or enjoyment of different styles of worship, at St Johns, a great strength. But we are aware it may be confusing to visitors, and some regular worshippers may prefer more of one style than another. When the monthly 'Prayer and Praise' on a Sunday evening, was stopped because of COVID, we didn't reintroduce it, but included more modern worship songs in Morning Praise, but perhaps there are views on this we aren't aware of. So, we need to objectively find out from our church memberships what their views are. Similarly with our ageing congregations how and what are the most appropriate ways of outreach in our community. On 4th May the church will be holding a Café Style morning worship service to encourage discussion on this and other subjects to glean people's views.
- **8. The Mickleover Foodbank** For some time now we have had a very successful and popular foodbank in the village. It currently is open on Wednesdays and Thursdays each week at the Vicarage Park Pavilion between 12-2.00pm. St John's and All Saints support this work and publicise its opening times at appropriate meetings and services. St Johns also helps transport surplus food to the 'Hope Centre' in the city following the Fruit and Vegetable Market each Friday morning.
- **9.** How do we engage with the new estates We are very conscious of the building of the new estates across Mickleover and the surrounding area. These all fall within one of our Parish boundaries and as such we have a responsibility to provide appropriate pastoral support for those families who move into these new homes. As noted in item 7 above we are conscious we can't do everything, and we should be open to how the Holy Spirit wants us to actively become involved with people. Peter is abreast of this key issue and is exploring what we can and should do.
- **10. Breakfast church** All Saints have successfully launched this service at 8.00am on one Sunday a month for those who wish to be involved in worship, but, have school sports and other activities later in the day. Although it has started small it has shown great signs of encouragement. St John's are not considering this at present due to a lack of resources, but it is not being ignored as a very viable opportunity.

DIOCESAN MESSAGE

APRIL 2025

Bishop Malcolm writes....

The message of Holy Week and Easter is that God's love for us in Jesus is Good News - the best news anyone could ever get. How are we doing at making this obvious to everyone, as it has become obvious to us?

One way we do it is simply to be present in each and every local community across Derbyshire. The way we are with our neighbours, the way we are as a church, and the way we are with each other are all supposed to express the love of God in Christ – and very often they do! Where there is a



community of life and love and hospitality, people will experience 'good news' simply by walking through the door and being made welcome. Others will simply see the church tower, and be prompted to pray. But how else do we share the wonders of the life in Christ we have been blessed with? Another way is by making sure our churches are always places where people who are coming with questions about life and faith can find help in their search. Local churches either do it alone or they can team up to ensure there's always something going on locally geared towards helping people make a start with Jesus. This can be one of the many courses available, or simply a fun evening in church or café or pub where any question is taken seriously, and where new disciples and others can explore the scriptures honestly, making the connections with everyday life.

I do enjoy my ministry a lot – but the best thing I get to do as a bishop is to do confirmations. Hearing the stories of people's search for God – and sometimes of how God has surprised them without their previously having been interested – this is an extraordinary privilege. It encourages the whole church when they tell their story. I thank God for the many churches where an annual confirmation course has once again become routine – something we lost perhaps during Covid, but now have the opportunity to revive. More and more we are hearing of newcomers, especially young people, just turning up at church wanting to see what goes on and to find out more. They don't necessarily want to be smothered – but they are glad when there is clear information about what is going on and how they can engage if they want to.....

It is also worth thinking of that most searching and enquiring today happens online. My guess is that some of those who are just randomly turning up at church have begun their search out there. There are a range of great online resources out there to help people become disciples of Jesus – for younger people #thewayuk on Instagram or YouTube or Facebook facebook.com/twuktv/ is a great place to start. Or there is the Christian Enquiry Agency christianity.org.uk/site-map And there is helpful material on the Church of England website too churchofengland.org/faith-life/what-we-believe

This April we keep company with Jesus on his road to Good Friday and to Easter while the guns of war still sound, and in a world where human failure and sin are all too evident. So many lives are broken and hurting. There are many and various factors at play: with ever deepening poverty and rising inequality, with the global rise in political extremism, and with today's preference for social media silo talk rather than open, honest conversation. Meanwhile the climate emergency only gets more urgent. It would be easy to give in, and give up hope. We must not. And yet, even in these perilous times, Sunday by Sunday, many are finding real hope in Jesus, the crucified and risen one. Jesus' life, death, and resurrection are still good news to those who encounter him alive and present today. In Him there is a new creation – a whole new world. Let's find ways old and new to pass this on. *The Rt Revd Malcolm Macnaughton*
