

WHO IS OUR NEIGHBOUR?

The Parable of the Good Samaritan is possibly one of the best known of Jesus' parables, even by those who have never opened the Bible. The concept of being 'a Good Samaritan' has entered our language in general usage, as someone who offers help to another, without an ulterior motive; and when the Rev Chad Varah, who as a Church of England priest in London in 1953, was motivated to set up a phone line offering help to those in distress, he chose to name it 'The Samaritans' after the parable.

Today many people look at this parable as being a straightforward instruction to us from Jesus to look after those in need. When aware of the tensions which existed between the Jewish people and the Samaritans during the time of Christ, this parable challenges us to consider who our neighbour truly is, acting with kindness towards those in need, without fear or favour. That care, help and true human kindness exist within those on the margins, those who are seen as 'other', within society.

This way of looking at the parable of the Good Samaritan is very much needed in our world today. Barley a day goes by when I am not horrified by the language

used by some leaders around the world to describe those who they perceive to be unlike themselves or not worthy of help. The language used within our country recently, towards those who receive PIP (Personal Independence Payments) or other benefits, has been truly horrifying.



Not debating policy but setting one group of society against another, using language designed to alienate and dehumanise those in need of support.

This way of reading the parable, is not the only way, however. Early Christian theologians read the parable and interpreted it as an allegory, that is a story with a hidden meaning. Different elements of the story were said to represent parts of the story of the relationship between humanity and God. For Augustine, one of the greatest Christian thinkers of all time, the injured man was said to represent Adam (in turn representing the whole of humanity); the robbers are the devil and his helpers who enticed Adam into sin and left him half alive, having lost the original connection with God; the priest and Levite were said wo represent the rules of the Old Testament, which had not been able to restore humanities relationship with God; The Samaritan who comes along and offers actual healing is therefore Jesus, who binds the wounds of

humankind. The oil used in the process represents hope and forgiveness of sins, offered by Jesus to heal our wounds. The animal upon which the wounded man is placed, represents Jesus' physical body – His incarnation – Literally taking upon himself our burdens, our sins, and carrying us to a place where we can receive complete healing. The inn was said to be the Church, who was there to provide shelter and support during the period of healing, carrying out the instructions of Jesus whilst he was away. The two denarii were said to represent the double love commandment, given by Jesus, which could then be used to help others in turn, or, for the theologian Origen, the two Denari represented the Father and the Son, who together enable our healing to take place.

This way of looking at the parable of the Good Samaritan was about focusing upon spiritual healing, saying that we must attend to our spiritual needs as much as our physical ones, and that injuries to our spiritual health are just as important as injuries to our flesh. In this way of looking at the parable, the Church provides a safe-haven for those in need of recovery and healing. A place where each person's wellbeing is attended to in whatever way they need, regardless of their background.

Augustine's writings, from the late fourth and early fifth centuries, contained for the first time, both ways of looking at this parable. Like Augustine, I believe we have a lot to learn from this parable when read in a straight-forward way; but I would like to suggest that we should also re-awaken our understanding of this parable being about spiritual need, and the healing offered by Christ. Many people today question the need to come to church, or the very need for faith at all. They do not see that the Church has anything to offer them. As members of the Church of England, we have to accept that many people feel particularly wary of this church in particular. We are not always trusted, or seen as somewhere safe. In the more traditional symbolic way of looking at this parable, the Church is represented by the Inn. The Church is a place of healing, care, and kindness. A place offering sanctuary for those who have been injured, and a place to which Jesus promises to return.

People's physical needs are very real, but so are their spiritual ones, and it is that spiritual healing and reconciliation which we as Christians believe the Church can offer.

So let us, like Augustine, look to this Parable as a reminder to not walk to the other side when we see someone in need, and also focus upon making these Churches a safe-haven of spiritual healing and kindness. Amen

Too often people are devalued or dismissed because of what they have been through in life. Sometimes it's because of what others have done to them or sometimes what they have done to others, or themselves.

If you have ever watched antique programmes on TV, you will know there are valuable items discovered in the most unlikely places; you just have to know what you're looking for. Jesus does. In His eyes you may be 'down' but you're not 'out'.

Peter's sorrow over denying Jesus ran so deep that he decided to go back to his old job as a fisherman. Can you imagine the gossip around the harbour? 'That's the guy who turned his back on Jesus.' Were Peter a minister, we would have called for

his resignation. At the very least, he would have nothing to say that we would be interested in listening to. Yet, Peter was the first person Jesus went looking for after the resurrection. And when Jesus saw him, He never mentioned it – not even once. But three times He asked him, 'Do you love me?' When Peter answered yes three times, Jesus said, 'Feed my sheep,' referring to his future as a pastor and leader of the early church (see John 21:15-17).

Jesus looked beyond Peter's failed past and saw his future. Peter's failure was not a surprise to Jesus, He had seen it coming and warned him, 'When you have repented and turned to me again, strengthen your brothers.' The weakness he had overcome and our Lord's restoring grace became some of Peter's greatest lessons in his future helping others.

Yes, God will reprove us, but it's for the purpose of restoring us and using us for His future purposes.

Giving in Grace

Our Church Our Challenge Our Choice

When Jesus undertook his ministry he did not do so alone. He chose to surround himself with people who would assist him during his journeys, and then take forward his teachings following his death. In the letters of the New Testament we see the followers of Jesus trying to work out how to continue this ministry: spreading the gospel to new places; looking after members of the new communities of followers that were developing around the Mediterranean; resolving disputes that arose due to not having Jesus physically there to guide them during these developments. Being a Christian has never been something undertaken in isolation. Through our baptisms we become members of the family of God, and like all families we each bring different gifts and talents, strengths and weaknesses. There will be times when we can offer more, and times when we have to step back; times when we can take the lead, and times when we each need help and support.

This August we will be running a 'Giving in Grace' campaign at St John's, like the one we ran last year at All Saints, during which will invite everyone to consider what God's call might be upon them at this time. Do you have particular gifts that God might be calling you to use within the Church? Might God be calling you to be more involved in the services? Do you have a particular passion for the environment that might be calling you to involvement in the Eco Group? Do you feel called to help with young people's ministry or with the welcome provided at the Rest Stop Café? Might God be prompting you to develop your prayer life further, praying for the needs of our community? Leaflets will be available highlighting the various roles within St John's where we would especially welcome volunteers, but if you feel a particular calling that has not been thought of, please do also let us know. We will also be asking people to consider their regular giving to church. You may not be aware, but the costs of running of each church are dependent upon the generosity of those who make donations, and the fees received from 'occasional offices' such as Weddings. We are not businesses, but like businesses we receive regular bills, and planned giving helps up to be able to plan our spending more effectively, for example what repairs we can undertake each year, or how might we develop the facilities in church further. There may also be some people whose personal circumstances might have changed. Perhaps they can no longer give in the way they once did, but now have the ability to be involved in other ways? Perhaps you have given the same amount to church each month for years, and have simply never thought about changing the amount? As a society, we are often very embarrassed to discuss money, but without everyone's generous support, our churches would not be able to run.

We hope you will each join in the conversation about what God might be prompting you to be involved with, this August.

Archdeacon Nicky writes...

One of the habits deeply ingrained into me in teaching was looking back and reflecting on progress. Also, the importance of resting after extended periods of busyness to replenish, renew your energy and be ready to start again. That rhythm established by God in creation – working, reviewing, resting, repeat.



August can usually have a slightly slower pace and different rhythm. Opportunities to reflect, rest and plan next steps. God's gift to us. Letting go the tyranny of the to-do-list. Choosing to prioritise things that often don't make it onto the list.
