Psalm 46 (Luke 23v33-43)

We are coming to the end of the Church's year and next week we move into Advent and begin to turn towards Christmas. We will hear the prophecies, foretelling the birth of the Saviour. The one who God would send to save His people. I find that I also spoke on this Sunday last year. At that time, I reflected on who or what we might be following. Today, I thought I would ask a slightly different question – if we are choosing someone to follow – king, politician, pop idol, football team, what is it we expect from them?

My guess is that somehow, despite our desire to make our own way in life we are still all seekers after something or someone who can show us how to live a better life. And maybe also, in a world full of increasingly fake news, we are still all seekers after truth. Today is sometimes known as the Feast of Christ the King but for most of us this is a relatively new occasion. Most of you will remember this as "Stir up Sunday" from the words of the old prayer for the day. The Feast was introduced by Pope Pius XI in 1925. In the aftermath of the First World War. He could see how fractured and divided the world had become. National Pride caused people to see each other as enemies just because of where they were born. To counter this the Pope wanted to stress that all Christians belong to one Kingdom, the kingdom of Christ. It is disheartening to think that many of the issues that were faced in 1925 are still being faced today. Issues to do with nationality and how we practice our faith still divide when God sees us all as His children with the potential to be heirs of His kingdom.

Psalm 46 was also written at a time of great uncertainty for the Jewish people. It resonates with us today as it must have resonated in the world of uncertainty in 1925. The Jews had just returned from exile and were rebuilding the Temple. They were constantly in fear of attack and conquest. The Psalm talks of God being our strength and refuge, a very present help in trouble. It reminds us that our God is not just a local God but God of all the world. He holds all things in His hands. We are safe, in the midst of all we see around us because He is God and He is in control. It is hard to believe sometimes, isn't it? We may be fearful of many things both personal and national. The risk is that we focus too much on these things and not on the God who created us and saved us. He is the God who is our refuge but so often we lose sight of Him by becoming consumed with the things close at hand.

The Psalm gives us an answer to these worries. It is twofold – come and see the works of the Lord. Be aware. Watch for what God is doing around us. Look for his work in creation and in our own lives. Owning His work in the small things will help us to see Him in the big.

And secondly – Be Still. Just stop and know Him. Know Him as Almighty God – expand your vision of what He can do by waiting and watching. He is King of all the world. Surely, He is a God worth following?

You may think that the Gospel reading we have just had an odd one for this time of year. More fitting for Easter than Advent or Christmas. So why read this today you may ask.

The answer is that the cross is what it meant for Jesus, the image of God among us, to be king. His Kingship meant that He came to challenge the world order, to lift up the poor and heal the sick. He was a refuge for those who came to Him in need. He challenged the authorities and ultimately went to die for us. So how does that make us feel about the claim that Jesus makes, to be our King? Does He even look like a King to us? He showed in His own life many of the qualities of serving and caring valued by our monarchy and yet, ultimately, He is a different sort of king. A King with ultimate, saving power.

In the reading He is challenged by the soldiers "If you are a King, save yourself" but Jesus knew that being a King meant death for Him so that others might be saved. Ultimately, He Himself is safe because He knows God holds Him in his hands as He holds us also. The soldiers do not recognize this type of Kingship but the thief hanging next to Him knows Him for who He is and pleads "Remember me when you come into your kingdom". This thief somehow understood who Jesus really was. He saw that Jesus was a King of a very different and eternal kingdom – but surely a King worth following.

God sent Jesus to earth because He loves each one of us and longs to restore His relationship with each of us. Sometimes stuff gets in the way between us and God doesn't it. We thought about those things that get in the way earlier when we said the confession, but we also heard that God longs to love us and forgive us. He has open arms to welcome us if we will come to Him. Ultimately, in all we face He is our safe space. In the Bible He is described as our shield and as a mother hen who gathers us under her wings.

There are many Bible stories of people being met by God when they in fear and hiding. David meets God in the caves. Elijah meets God in a cave on a mountain and, although He was not running away, Jesus sought out space and silence to pray to God. Most notably in the Garden of Gethsemane.

So, as we end this year with all its fears and tribulations and take our first tentative steps into the unknown let us remember that God is our refuge and there is a kingdom that is His alone. We see His kingdom every time truth triumphs. Every time the poor are cared for. Every time someone is forgiven. Every time true justice prevails. It may feel that Jesus is a long time coming but He is still here by His Spirit and is still working if we have but eyes to see Him and hearts willing to take up the challenge of following Him. He still invites each one of us to be His friend and to follow Him, as our King and Saviour. He is our safe place when we are deeply troubled. The refuge God offers may not free us from the world's troubles, but it assures us that God is in the control if we focus on Him and we are ultimately safe for all eternity.
