



ADVENT TO THE PRESENTATION OF CHRIST AT THE TEMPLE

Ask any member of the clergy how they are at this time of year and you may not get the answer you were expecting...whilst others plan for parties, for most clergy this is their busiest time of year. Advent feels far harder to observe than Lent, because it feels like there is very little time to take in the wonder of waiting. In the story of Jesus at the home of his close friends Martha and Mary (Luke 10:38-42), it feels like we are definitely in the place of Martha rather than her sister Mary. But when a little space comes my way, I like to turn to those who have made the time to reflect and have the gift of writing. One author I enjoy reading is Malcolm Guite.

In his advent book, published in 2012 – 'Sounding the seasons' he has written a series of sonnets and I'd like to share two of these with you. The first one is entitled: 'Prologue- Sounding the seasons'

'Tangled in time, we go by hints and guesses,
Turning the wheel of each returning year.
But in the midst of failures and successes
We sometimes glimpse the love that casts out fear.
Sometimes the heart remembers its own reasons
And beats a Sanctus as we sing our story,
Tracing the threads of grace, sounding the seasons
That lead at last through time to timeless glory.
From the first yearning for a Saviour's birth
To the full joy of knowing sins forgiven,
We start our journey here on God's good earth
To catch an echo of the choirs of heaven.
I send these out, returning what was lent,
Turning to praise each 'moment's monument'.'

I like the phrase 'tangled in time' – it brings an image in my mind of being caught up. We are going forward and there are hints and guesses about God's purposes in undertaking the journey that is going from January to December. We catch 'an echo of the choirs of heaven' which leads to us returning to God in praise, as we recognise what he has given us.

Looking back over the past year, certainly for myself and Helen we have had to face two major challenges, Helen's loss of her mother combined with the accident to my knee. We were so touched by so many messages of support and reassurances of prayers for us and we are so grateful for each and every one. I am also acutely aware that the rest of the ministry team have had their own challenges, not the least of which has been Clare's health too and I know she would want to add her thanks to everyone for their prayers and practical support of her.

God never promises any of us an easy life, but he promises always to be with us in good times and in bad, watching, caring, loving and sometimes rescuing. We are never completely on our own and that should lead us to a renewed spirit of thankfulness. 'We sometimes glimpse the love that casts out fear'.

Thankfulness should shape our witness too. At this time of year, we meet old friends, neighbours and acquaintances. Sometimes reading Christmas letters it is as if everything has been perfect for the writer and their family. If that is so, we rejoice with them, however it's equally OK to write that the past year has been tough and at the same time say, 'through it all, I am so thankful that the Lord has carried me'.

People who don't yet hold a living faith can sometimes accuse Christians of hypocrisy. From the outside it can be hard to see how a relationship with God through Jesus Christ can help. 'Your faith is just a crutch!' is one phrase that can be flung at us. If faith is a crutch, then I for one am very grateful. Having to get used to using two crutches both before and after the operation was essential. I couldn't have recovered without them. But Christian faith is of course far more than the picture of a crutch. The promise of Jesus is that he comes to live in our hearts through the gift of the Holy Spirit. He also opens the gates of heaven to all who believe in his name.

In his lifetime, Jesus' motivations, his words and his actions were often completely misunderstood, and in this next sonnet, O Rex Gentium (O King of the nations) Malcolm picks up the seeming contradictions of Jesus' life, death, his coming again.

'O King of our desire whom we despise,
King of the nations never on the throne,
Unfound foundation, cast-off cornerstone,
Rejected joiner, making many one:
You have no form or beauty for our eyes,
A King who comes to give away his crown,
A King within our rags of flesh and bone,
We pierce the flesh that pierces our disguise,
For we ourselves are found in you alone.
Come to us now and find in us your throne,
O King within the child within the clay,
O hidden King who shapes us in the play
Of all creation. Shape us for the day
Your coming Kingdom comes into its own.'



STAMPING OUT CANCER

As Christmas approaches and everyone is sending cards to friends and family, it gives us

the opportunity to collect Used Postage Stamps to help fund Research into Bone Cancer Treatment

For the last 2 years we have been able to contribute with stamp collecting and other related activities around £25000!

This could not have been achieved without YOUR help

But what is this research? One example is: Osteosarcoma is difficult to treat and survival rates have improved little in recent decades. A key issue is that treatment relies on old anti-cancer drugs and in some cases, the treatment stops working. A major recent focus in bone cancer research is the identification of overactive biochemical pathways in cancer cells and the development of new drugs that can block such pathways.

This research will explore whether a specific enzyme (a protein which speeds up chemical processes), known as inhibitory kappa B kinase alpha, or IKKa for short, plays a role in osteosarcoma development. The researchers also want to investigate whether blocking this enzyme can inhibit the growth of osteosarcoma cells.

A LETTER FROM CLARE


Dear friends, as many of you know, the last few months have been incredibly difficult for me, and I wanted to take the opportunity to express my deep gratitude for the love and support I have received from you all. I will not pretend that experiencing a heart attack was not terrifying (it absolutely was, and the journey of recovery has not been easy), but throughout I have felt held in prayer, and supported in a way that I have never experienced before in my life. The cards, gifts, food, messages of support, visits, lifts, advice, practical support around the house, the knowledge that I was held in prayer, together with the time and space that I needed to come to terms with what had happened, made all of the difference to my recovery. I will be eternally grateful to you all!

Since I arrived in Mickleover, you have provided me with an incredibly supportive environment in which to begin my ministry, and I have learnt so much from you all. Since being taken into hospital, you have taught me something far more profound – What it truly means to be a part of a loving church family. The personal impact of this has been life-changing, and the example of this love and support will be something that I will take with me into my future ministry, wherever God calls me.

As I am in the final year of my curacy, I will be heading off on placement for a time in the new year, before returning to Mickleover to await where God calls me to serve next. Once the details of my placement are finalised, I will let you know.



BURUNDI CHARITABLE GIVING





At their November meeting, having discussed the topic at previous meetings, the All Saints' PCC agreed to add Association des Jeunes Vulnerable l'auto Developpement

(A.DE.VU.DE) to their Annual Charitable Giving list. This is the Association founded by Rev'd Noe Bukuru who visited All Saints with Bishop Malcolm at Pentecost. Some of the money raised at the Christmas Tree Festival will be sent as a 'one-off' and will be followed by a monthly contribution of £30. (It costs £13 to feed a family of between 5

and 7 for a week. This comprises of 8kg of cassava flour, 6kg of beans and a few biscuits for the children. (Meat, vegetables and fruit are too expensive.) There are 38 families in their area. More details of are displayed on the noticeboard at the back of church on the kitchen side.

At the November meeting we discussed:

- A child height design and wording needs to be created for the new glass doors that will be installed where the current main door to church is. If anyone has any ideas, please contact Peter.
- The stonework in the church porch has been carved and fitted. The old boiler chimney has also undergone work.
- The first Midweek Matinee was held on October, and was enjoyed by those who came. The next showing will be Cinderella on November 26th
- There has been great interest in the Christmas Tree Festival with 21 groups signing up to display trees. We are in need of stewards for the event, there is a signup sheet at the back of church for volunteers. Monies raised from the event will be split between All Saints, Derby Food 4 Thought and Burundi. The event will begin on Sunday 30th November and the church will be open daily until 7th December.
- Proposal to install two disabled parking spaces near the slope closet to church in the car park.
- Mycologist has identified over 50 species of fungi in the Vicarage Garden, the graveyard and the woodlands. A number of rare species have been recorded.

Meeting held at: St John's on 19th November 2025

At the meeting we ...

- Received an update from Clare Penter on the work of the Bramblebrook Pre-School that uses our Hall on weekdays.
- Agreed a budget for 2026 noting that this involves a significant deficit.
- Adopted a Code of Conduct for PCC proceedings.
- Agreed updated guidelines for hiring our facilities and booking fees for 2026.
- Agreed to invite someone from the diocesan Mission, Evangelism & Parish Revitalisation team to speak at our Sunday morning service to help us work out the way forward for our worship and outreach. This is planned for early 2026.
- Heard from Clare on the progress of her curate's training.
- Discussed what vulnerable groups we have in our church and what we should be doing to ensure their safety.
- Received a report on the October meeting of Derby City Deanery Synod.
- Agreed to accept a quote to install a ramp and handrails in the doorway from the Link to the Hall passage. We hope to have this in place before Christmas.

Bishop Malcolm writes...

Advent Hope - Light in the darkness

As I write it is not even December yet but by 4pm it is already nearly dark! All the darker as the weather gets wilder and wetter, with the promise of the white stuff coming any day now. At least in the dark the snow will bring its own unique reflective brightness.

Whilst officially still autumn until December 21st – by which time the last leaf in Derbyshire will surely have fallen - these



rapidly shortening days and lengthening hours of night shroud us in this season with foreboding, as much as in anticipation. These are the days we learn to appreciate the light, and begin to pine for more of it long before Spring comes.

Our regular seasonal gathering gloom is more than matched by the dark shadows which prevail in our nation and in the wider world. Like buses it seems existential crises all arrive at once – poverty and inequality, destructive weather events caused by climate change, and persistent conflict erupting in devastating wars. Dark days indeed for a world that had come to believe in progress. And most especially, for the poor, the vulnerable, and the dispossessed.

At our churches in Advent, Sunday by Sunday we hear the words of the Hebrew prophets. They were realistic about darkness, about human failure and sin, and its impact on the whole of society, especially on those who were most vulnerable – in that time the orphan, the widow, the alien or stranger. A society that failed to live up to God's call to justice, integrity, and compassion was doomed to fail. Judgment was inevitable where people turned their back on the responsibilities of being human.

In the days of the Hebrew prophets there were those who thought you could get away with thinking of your own nation only. But this was not the whole picture. In the scriptures and most especially in the New Testament we see a different perspective emerging – the recognition of the whole human family as created by God, invited to share in the 'fullness of life' which is Jesus' gift to us.

The internationalism of the Gospel is a core value of the Christian faith. Contemporary versions of Christianity that revert to the attitudes of the Crusades are perversions of our faith. As the established church in England we have to be careful not to misrepresent Jesus, the Saviour not just of our people, but of all people. Why? Because 'God so loved the world.' Not just me and the people who agree with me. Not just my people, not just my ethnic group or my country, but the whole wide world. This includes everyone:

The orphaned child taken care of within a family fleeing the fighting in Sudan. The elderly woman who cannot understand why she has to leave her pacific island home, soon to be devoured by the rising sea. The young man fleeing persecution for his faith. All these, along with our friends and neighbours here at home and at school and at work, are part of that same human family into which Jesus was born, and for which Christ died and rose again. And yet the journey is so hard, and the way is so dark, for many today.

John Donne, 16th Century poet and Dean of St Paul's in London, published a poem expressing the darkness of his grief at the loss of his beloved. On St Lucy's Day, 13th December, then believed to be the shortest day, he wrote of his experience of

loss: 'It is the year's midnight, the Dies Lucies'. Not from 13th December, but from the end of the month, the days do begin to turn brighter and longer again. Donne in his darkness did not despair absolutely – he knew the light would return. So even in the thick darkness of December we detect the seeds of hope. As someone reminded me recently, during the winter there is life and growth – we just don't see it because it is going on underground.

This theme of light and darkness stays with us throughout Advent, and then on Christmas morning the Gospel hope resounds: with Jesus coming 'The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.'

May the light of Christ shine ever more brightly in our world and in our time, and in each one of us. We do well to learn from the Jewish Rabbi who asked his students: "how do we know when the night has ended and the day has begun?"

One bright student offered an answer: "When I look out at the fields and I can distinguish between my field and the field of my neighbour's, that's when the night has ended and day has begun."

The rabbi shook his head. That was not it.

Another student answered: "When I look from the fields and I see a house and I can tell that it's my house and not my neighbour's house, that's when the night has ended and the day has begun."

No - that wasn't it either.

A third student suggested: "When I can distinguish the animals in the yard – and I can tell a cow from a horse – that's when the night has ended."

Disappointed in his students, the Rabbi replied, and went on to say:

"When you look into the eyes of the person who is beside you and you can see that that person is your brother or your sister, when you can recognize that person as a friend, then, finally, the night has ended and the day has begun."

May God open our eyes to the true light that has come into the world, and make us able to live in this light always.

'The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world' John 1.9. Amen. Come, Lord Jesus.
