Epiphany - Ephesians 3: 1-12, Matthew 2 1 to 12

Have any of us been on a long journey this Christmas holiday? Was that by camel or by car? These days, Mr. Google is a pretty good mapping aid to have with you to show you the way. We don't tend to use the stars to see by although it is amazing to go for a walk on a night with a full moon.

The ancient world never forgot the night sky. Many people particularly in the countries East of Palestine, developed a deep study of the stars and the planets, giving meanings to many. They believed that everything was interconnected and when something was important on earth, you could expect to see it reflected in the heavens. Alternatively, a remarkable event among the stars and planets must mean, they thought, a remarkable event on earth.

Over the years, many scholars have tried to identify the star that led the wise men to trek those many hundreds of miles by camel. One explanation could be the conjunction of Jupiter and Saturn. Since Jupiter was known as the Kingly planet and Saturn was thought to represent the Jewish people, it would be an obvious conclusion that a new King was on the scene in the land of Israel. Whatever gave rise to the new bright star in the sky, it was sufficient for these 3 to make the journey and to bring three very costly gifts, namely Gold, Frankincense and Myrrh.

Gold for a king (which would actually have been quite useful for Joseph and Mary as they had to make a dash for it to Egypt to escape Herod's troops, Frankincense for the worship of God and Myrrh was a spice used to anoint a body for burial. All three are prophetic, indicating just who Jesus is.

Of course, we know that the wise men's arrival at Herod's court provoked no small amount of consternation. What Matthew is telling us is political dynamite. Jesus is the true King of the Jews, not Herod who indeed died shortly thereafter. It was his son Herod Antipas who encountered Jesus before the cross. The house of Herod did not take kindly to the idea of anyone else claiming to be 'king of the Jews'.

At the heart of the Christmas story in Matthew's gospel is a baby who poses such a threat to the most powerful man around that he kills a whole village full of other male babies in order to try and get rid of him. From the moment of Jesus' birth there is a price on his head. Plots are hatched; angels have to warn Joseph; they only just escape from Bethlehem in time. Herod the Great, who thought nothing of killing members of his own family including his own wife when he suspected them of scheming against him, and who gave orders when dying that the leading citizens of Jericho should be slaughtered so that people would be weeping at his own funeral. As Herod's power had increased, so had his paranoia, as we see in dictators the world over. Jesus was born in a land in a time of trouble, tension, violence and fear. Banish all thoughts of peaceful Christmas scenes. Matthew's gospel which we will be following through this year insists that we see in Jesus, even when things are at their darkest the fulfilment of scripture.

No point arriving in comfort, when the world is in misery; no point having an easy life, when the world suffers from violence and injustice! Jesus came to be Emmanuel, God-

with-us and so he enters our pain and our suffering and ultimately pay the price to bring us all back into relationship with God our heavenly Father.

I want to close by quoting one of the messianic Psalms - Psalm 72 is just one of many prophecies about the coming King, the Messiah, and give us the wonderful promise that his rule will bring God's justice and peace to the whole world. The Psalm ends this way:

¹⁷May his name endure forever, his fame continue as long as the sun.

May all nations be blessed in him; may they will call him blessed.

¹⁸Praise be the Lord, the God of Israel, who alone does wondrous things.

¹⁹Blessed be his glorious name forever; may his glory fill the whole earth.

Amen and Amen.

At the start of this New Year, may we carry the praise of the Lord in our hearts, may we be those who join with the Angels in praising our Lord, who is almighty, and who loves us and the world completely and may we be those who take that message outside of these four walls with boldness and compassion. Amen.
